Ultimate Goal is Human Security

“Health security is one of the instruments and pathways to achieving human security.” (Sir George Alleyne)

The COVID-19 contagion has forced a dual focus on health and tourism and ultimately economics



Pandemics & Tourism:

Island paradises can become disease incubators without proper controls

- Tourism can indirectly contribute to pandemics: food waste, habitat interference & environmental vs. climate change
- Frequency and scale of travel → accelerates international spread
- Interactions of travelers → victims, sentinels, couriers, and transmitters for microbial pathogens



Learning from History

Tourism industry has quickly rebounded from disasters, pandemics, & epidemics

- Pandemics have been increasing since the 1980's - the next one could be deadlier
- Important theme of resilience:
 - Crisis management tools/strategies
 - Adaptation to new environments and circumstances
- Strategies of Resilience:
 - Coordination
 - Novel management techniques
 - Integrated network
 - Recognizing risks and responsibilities
 - Timely and scalable intervention



Preparing for the Next pandemic: *Linking Disaster, Tourism & Health*

- COVID-19 a case study in limited accessibility, overburdened health systems, inadequate access to healthcare, dis/mis-information, and unpreparedness
- Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) requires integration and multi-sectoral collaboration
- Mitigation of further harm after illness or injury paramount
- Health care, tourism and disaster reduction closely connected
- Disaster – situation requiring external support
- “Disaster risk” – potential for adverse outcomes
 - Casualties (death or injuries)
 - Infrastructure damage
 - Livelihood interruption
 - Disruption of day-to-day activities



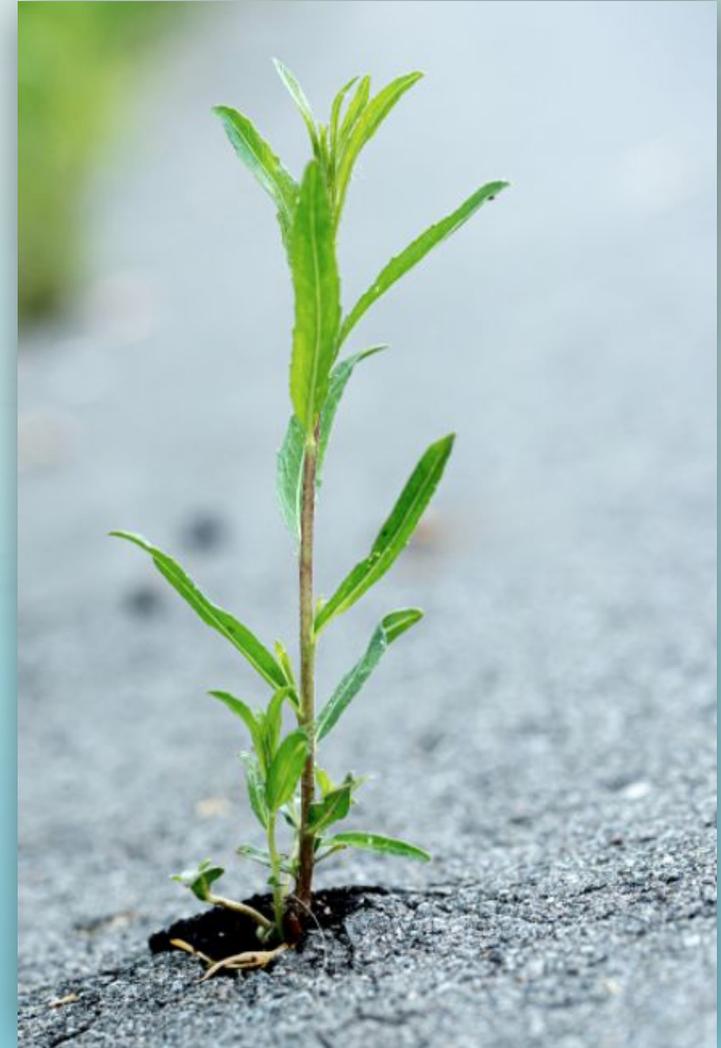
Framing a Response to COVID-19

- Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR)- tackling the root causes of disasters and disaster risk
 - Vulnerabilities intersecting with hazards (disaster typically manifesting)
 - Examples : floods, earthquakes, wildfires, pandemics etc.
 - Disasters emerge from choices to create and allow vulnerabilities
 - Inequity of wealth
 - Discrimination against populations
 - Lack of provision of education
 - Marginalization
 - Limited accessibility

Tourism's Defining Moment

- Local communities as centres of transformation
- Community-centred tourism framework to fit the interests and aspirations of local communities
- Deeper understanding of remote communities' challenges
- Consideration of “proximity tourism” based on local thought and local acting perspectives



Re-imagining Health & Tourism Integration

- Tourism
 - Creating new business models
 - Governments, market stakeholders, local communities for resilience and sustainability
- Need for flexible thinking
 - AI, Internet of things (IoT), technologies related to location, navigation, drones, robotics etc.
- Health
 - Integrating:
 - agriculture, nutrition security and health
 - CSOs into the policy and planning networks
 - Private/public sector
- Flexible thinking for integration of health
 - Social networking, promoting the rural sector, sourcing more resources locally etc.



Opportunities – Tourism and Health Program (THP) & Crafting a Regional Response Effort

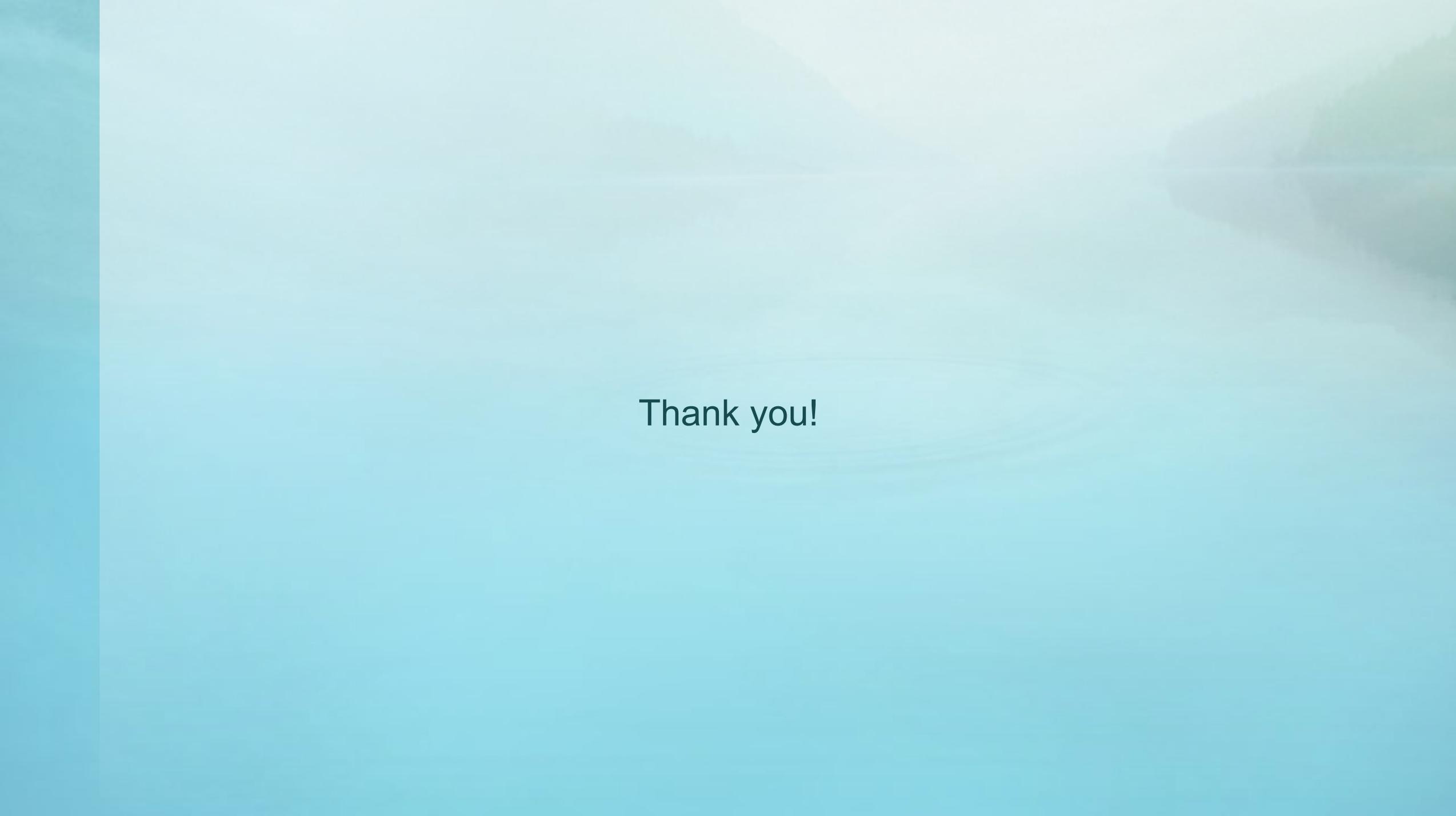
- Addressing health, safety and environmental sanitation threats to tourism via a multi-sectoral and multifaceted program
- Strengthen island states' capacity to prepare for and respond to public health threats
- Introduction of time early warning system and response tourism and health information system (THiS)
- Regional guidelines for response to traveler health issues
 - Accommodation and passenger ship settings
 - Food safety capacity
 - Hospital health safety and environmental standards
- Rapid and coordinated response to health threats



“All Hands On Deck”-- No room for Complacency
